

THE SCOTTISH ASSOCIATIONS NAVIGATIONAL RALLY CHAMPIONSHIP 2008



Supplementary Regulations

- 1 The Association of West Scotland Motor Sport Clubs and the East of Scotland Association of Car Clubs will jointly promote a Championship to be known as "The Scottish Associations Navigational Rally Championship 2008". The MSA Championship Registration Number is 59/2008.
- 2 The Championship will be held under the General Regulations of the Motor Sports Association Ltd (incorporating the provisions of the International Sporting Code of the FIA), these Supplementary Regulations and any other written instructions issued by the Championship organisers as well as the Supplementary Regulations and any other written instructions issued by the individual event organisers.
- 3 The Championship Co-ordinator is Steve Turnbull. See SR.10 for contact details.
- 4 The Championship Stewards are Roger Reed, Stan Quirk and Jonathan Lord

5 Events

- (i) The Championship will comprise the following National B permit Navigational Rallies:

- (ii) In accordance with dispensations granted to AWSMSC and ESACC by the MSA, a Clubman grade competition licence is sufficient to compete on the above events. General Regulation C(a)51 is modified accordingly for these events.
- (iii) Supplementary Regulations for each event will be published by the organising club. The Championship Co-ordinator will endeavour to distribute Supplementary Regulations to competitors, but it is the competitors' responsibility to ensure they enter events in which they wish to score points.
- (iv) To ensure an entry into a Championship event, competitors are requested to enter before the closing date, which will not be set more than one week in advance of the event.
- (v) If an event is unable to run on its designated date it will only remain a round of the 2008 Championship if the reason for the initial non-running of the event is force majeure as approved by the Championship Stewards. Acceptable examples of this are inclement weather conditions, industrial dispute or other similar events which are out with the control of the organisers. If the Championship Stewards approve force majeure, the Championship Co-ordinator will allocate, in

consultation with the organising club, a new date for the event. Notification of the new date will be made to all registered competitors a minimum of 30 days before the re-scheduled date.

- (vi) All events in the Championship are required to observe the guidelines in Appendix A. For competitors the following factors are important, the minimum length of the event will be 90 miles, the route will use no rough surfaces and a minimum of white roads, mileage loops will only be used if it stated in the event Supplementary Regulations and all other mileages used on that event are ± 0.25 miles.

6 Entry

- (i) The Championship is open to members of any club affiliated to AWSMSC or ESACC.
- (ii) There is no limit to the number of competitors.
- (iii) Registration opens on publication of these Supplementary Regulations and closes when signing-on ceases at the start of the last event.
- (iv) Entry into the Championship is by any of the following two methods.
 - (a) Competitors can complete and return an entry form to the Championship Co-ordinator at any point in the duration of the Championship via post, e-mail or in person.
 - (b) Competitors can enter the National B section of any Championship event. Entry to Clubman, 12-Car or Historic sections of Championship events do not count. While entry is automatic to the Championship, competitors can withdraw by e-mailing or writing to the Championship Co-ordinator. This must be done within 14 days of the first event in which they compete.

7 Classes

- (i) The Championship will consist of six classes, with separate classes for drivers and navigators at three levels of experience.
- (ii) The eligibility requirements at each level will be defined as follows:

EXPERT	Open to any competitor.
INTERMEDIATE	Limited to competitors who can comply with the following: In any one calendar year from 2004 to 2007, scored no more than five class wins at Intermediate (Non-Expert) or a higher level on navigational events of Nat B status.
BEGINNER	Limited to competitors who can comply with the following: Have been classified as a finisher in no more than 8 navigational events of Nat B status in the past 2 years and have been classified as a finisher in no more than 6 navigational events in any one calendar year from 2000 to 2007 (inclusive).

For the purpose of the above definitions, a Navigational event includes any road rally, historic road rally or navigational rally.

- (iii) Entry into the Championship under SR.6.iv.b is subject to competitors being eligible to register for the class. This does not prevent competitors from entering any individual event, subject to the event entry eligibility requirements, but will prevent competitors from scoring points in the Championship.
- (iv) Competitors are expected to inform the Championship Co-ordinator if they are not eligible to register for a class in the Championship under which they enter a Championship event. If the Championship Co-ordinator has information available to them that a competitor is not eligible to be registered they may not included the competitor in the list of registered competitors.
- (v) Classes in individual events should match the Championship classes.

- (vi) Competitors may register for more than one class provided they are eligible for each class they register for.
- (vii) The club under which a competitor registers will be the club indicated on the Championship entry form or the club under which the competitor enters their first event of the Championship. If a competitor is a member of more than one eligible club, they may nominate which club they wish to enter under. Once a competitor has started an event, the club under which they are registered cannot be changed.

8 **Points**

- (i) Points will be awarded to each registered competitor who starts each event based on their final position relative to other registered competitors in the same Championship class, ignoring tie-breakers and the furthest cleanest rule (General Regulation H90). Competitors may only score points in one class on any single event.
- (ii) The following scale of points will be used

Finish position in Championship class	Points awarded
1 st	30
2 nd	25
3 rd	22
4 th	20
5 th	18
Reducing at rate of 2 points per place until 11 th place with 6 points which will be the minimum possible score for being classed as a finisher	
Non-finisher e.g. OTL (GR H86)	5
Excluded	0

- (iii) A competitor will be awarded the following points for helping to organise or run a Championship event

Position	Points awarded
Clerk of the Course, Event Secretary	30
Other Officials named in event SRs	22
Other signed-on Officials. e.g. marshals	15

- (a) These points will be only be awarded once. The highest points value attained during the year will be the value used.
 - (b) Points for Clerk of the Course, the Secretary of the Meeting and other Officials named in event SRs will be awarded automatically and will be taken from event Supplementary Regulations.
 - (c) Points for being a Signed-on Official must be claimed from the Championship Co-ordinator within 7 days of the Championship event they wish to claim points for.
 - (d) Points will be awarded to the class for which the competitor is registered. If a competitor is registered for more than one class they must inform the Championship Co-ordinator within 7 days of the event which class they wish the points to awarded for, failing this the points will be awarded to class for which the competitor last scored points. If a competitor has not registered for the Championship the organiser's points will be awarded retrospectively to the class for which they first register.
- (iv) A competitor's total Championship score will count their best scores up to a maximum number of events, determined by the number of events which take place, as follows:

Number of events which run	7	6	5	4	3	2	1
Number of scores counted	5	4	4	3	2	2	1

- (v) Championship ties will be resolved using the following criteria and in the following order. All events will be counted.
 - (a) In favour of the competitor with the greater number of 1st place scores, then 2nd place scores, etc.
 - (b) In favour of the competitor who most often placed above the other.
 - (c) In favour of the higher placed competitor (as per the event final results) on the first event at which all tied competitors were present;
 - (d) In favour of the competitor who has scored the lowest cumulative penalty score during the Championship (using the minutes scoring system);
 - (e) If still not resolved, by declaring a shared award.
- (vi) There will be a Championship for the best club performance. Registration is automatic upon a club member who is registered scoring points in an event. The club score for each event will be the best three scores by individual members, irrespective of class, i.e. to a maximum of 90 points per event. All event scores count towards the club Championship score. The club for which a competitor scores points will as per SR.7.vii. Organiser points awarded under SR.8.iii will not be included in the club Championship.
- (vii) Interim results will be sent out *ad hoc*, and Provisional Results will be published as soon as possible following the last event (General Regulation A61(c)). Discrepancies should be notified to the Championship Co-ordinator within 7 days of publication.
- (viii) The following awards will be made:

1 st in each class	Trophy + Award
2 nd in each class	Award
Best club performance	Trophy

Awards are perpetual, but trophies remain the property of the Championship to be held for 11 months.

9 **Protests**

- (i) All eligibility challenges, disputes, irregularities or appeals should be addressed to the Championship Co-ordinator who will liaise with the Championship Stewards (General Regulation B17)

Appendix A – Event Guidelines

This section is primarily for organisers but will enable competitors to know the standard of event to expect.



- A1. Events should issue draft regulations to the Championship Co-ordinator 8 weeks prior to the event, and final versions to competitors 6 weeks before the event.
- A2. Events must be greater than 90 miles long – there is no maximum length for the Championship but less than 150 miles is suggested.
- A3. Events should be priced at not more than £40 entry fee (plus any insurance).
- A4. Events should include the following in their Entry Form:

Tick this box if you do not wish to automatically be entered in The Scottish Associations Navigational Rally Championship (if eligible) <input type="checkbox"/>
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- A5. Events should use the classes defined in these regulations.
 - (i) All clue types at Beginner level should be selected from the list of types attached to these regulations (Appendix B) or if not on the list, agreed in advance by a Championship Co-ordinator and the type of clue notified to the competitors before the start of the event.
 - (ii) Intermediate level clues should be one degree of difficulty above Beginner level. Expert clues are recommended to be one level harder than Intermediate. In both cases it is not required that the clues stem from the same type as the Beginner clue for the section.
- A6. Beginner competitors should be given the location of all the controls. Intermediate competitors should be given the location of two-thirds of the controls.
- A7. All clues and timecards must be checked by at least one competent other person than the compiler a minimum of 10 days before the event to allow time for any corrections to also be checked. The Championship coordinators will hold a list of potential clue checkers.
- A8. Competitors should be seeded in the entry list according to following guidelines:
 - (i) Current position in The Scottish Associations Navigational Rally Championship 2008If this is not possible then by the following in order:
 - (ii) Current position in any other 2008 Navigational Rally Championship
 - (iii) Finishing position in any 2007 Navigational Rally Championship
 - (iv) At the event organisers discretion taking into account the competitors past results and skills levels.
- A9. Events should issue results to competitors within 1 hour of the last competitor arriving at the finish venue. Where this is not possible, the results should be distributed to all competitors within 7 days.
- A10. Events should issue any awards on the night of the competition unless it is not possible to issue any results.
- A11. Events should whenever possible, display clues and their solutions for all classes, together with the correct route at the finish.
- A12. Events must return details of entries and results to the Championship Coordinator within 7 days of the event including the club the competitor is a member of except in the case where the competitor requested such details not to be held.

Appendix B – Beginner level clue types

This section lists the clue types to be expected at beginner level. In some cases other clue types may be used after agreement with the Championship Co-ordinator and providing details of the clue type are circulated to competitors before the event. This list is expected to alter through time – a copy of the current list will be maintained on the ESACC website on the Navigational Rally Championship pages.
